St Giles' has always been a Church for 'outsiders': on the edge of The City (literally), free thinkers, wonderers and creatives, pilgrims and the curious. We still are.

Advent is a season of expectation and hope. We make a pilgrimage through these four weeks, from darkness to light.

We anticipate the birth of Christ, 2000 years ago. We hear again all the prophecies and expectations of the Jewish people, awaiting the Messiah.

We also look forward to the close of this world, and the consummation of God's Kingdom of Justice, Peace and Love, here on earth. Christ will come again!

Before the service music may be playing, people may be praying - take a moment. Tune out any chatter, and prepare your heart.

The next hour is a pilgrimage of ancient and modern readings and music, to journey into the heart of the mystery, that is at the heart of everything: God.

This is your church. Please feel at home here. We offer worship several times a day, most days. Midweek it is quiet, short and simple. Sundays at 10am are the heart of this church.

The Eucharist (Mass, Holy Communion, Lord's Supper) has always been at the heart of Christian worship, since the first days after the death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus. It still is.

Every Sunday, 10.00-11.10am in the words of Scripture, music and song and Holy Communion we gather every Sunday with each other and God - at the end of one week and the beginning of the next.

The rhythm, week by week, is the everyday pattern of our living - ordinary and unremarkable. It is also a Divine dance, a great mystery and a life-changing encounter. Welcome.

If you have any questions, or aren't sure about anything, please ask someone near you in church. Don't worry about how everything works initially - you'll soon be at home in our worship. It is both ancient and always fresh. Church is just people and God - everyone belongs here.

John 14: 1 – 14 St John unfolds the mystery of the Incarnation

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John.
